



Content Libraries and Custom Ministry Resources

The library can hold Bible text, audio Scripture, gospel films, children's resources, discipleship materials, training PDFs, and locally approved ministry files.

Plain answer

The equipment only matters because of what it carries. A good library is organized, trusted, local-language friendly, and easy to browse on a phone.

Field steps

1. Start with language - Identify the local language, reading level, and whether audio is more useful than text.
2. Choose core resources - Prioritize Scripture, audio, gospel films, children's content, and discipleship basics.
3. Organize by use - Use simple folders like Read, Listen, Watch, Children, Training, and Share.
4. Test on phones - Open files on the kinds of phones people actually use.
5. Remove confusion - Delete duplicate, broken, or unclear files before field deployment.
6. Update carefully - Keep a record of what changed so partners know what is inside each kit.

Key points

Core content: Bible, audio Scripture, gospel media, training, and practical ministry resources.

Local fit: Language and format matter more than file quantity.

Offline first: Every key file should work without internet.

Board takeaway: The content library is the actual ministry payload.
