



Mission Statement

VillageServer helps missionaries and local leaders carry Scripture, gospel media, and practical ministry resources into places where internet, electricity, and local-language teaching are limited.

Plain answer

The mission is simple: make gospel access feel obvious for the person holding the phone. A person should be able to connect, open, listen, read, save, and share without needing a technical background.

Field steps

1. Listen first - Ask the missionary or local leader what language, device type, and power reality they face.
2. Choose the simplest path - Start with the lightest access method: phone sharing, microSD, USB, local Wi-Fi, projector, or satellite only when needed.
3. Load trusted resources - Prepare Scripture, audio, films, children's resources, and training files in a clear folder structure.
4. Teach one repeatable action - Show one person how to connect, save one resource, and share that same resource with someone nearby.
5. Report what worked - Write down what people used, what confused them, and what should change before the next rollout.

Key points

Who it serves: Missionaries, churches, schools, clinics, and trusted local leaders working in low-connectivity communities.

What it carries: Bible text, audio Scripture, gospel films, children's resources, discipleship files, and local-language training.

What it avoids: No complicated login, no dependence on mobile data, and no assumption that internet will be available.

Board takeaway: VillageServer is not a gadget project. It is a practical gospel-access tool for places ordinary websites cannot reach.
